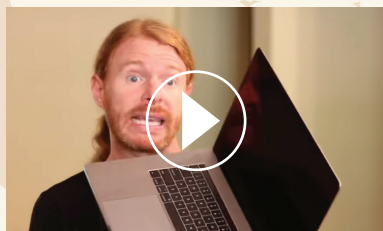
### LEAVING THE SLAVE STATE

On May 23rd, in 1788, South Carolina is the 8th State to ratify the Constitution. Prior to this date, South Carolina became an independent state when it adopted its own Constitution on March 26, 1776. At the time, South Carolina was a slave state, with most of the population being African slaves.

It was also the first state to vote in favor of secession from the union on December 20, 1860 and was readmitted back into the United States on July 9, 1868. Yet by 2020, South Carolina is found to be moving closer to the reality of being the first state to elect 2 black senators. **Conservative values are a strong barometer of the policies that guide the people of this state, just ask Harriet Holman.**

### CONGRESS AGREES

On May 25th in 1787, the Constitutional Congress begins in PA, with all states represented but Rhode Island. The war for independence from England is now 4 years in the rear-view mirror. The people had even agreed on the Articles of Confederation 6 years earlier, allowing for a federal government to exist, with very limited powers. George Washington is elected convention president, as they convened to meet in Independence Hall (Philadelphia, PA).

This is true in families, businesses, and countries. Some might say that it is about finding a new balance and ensuring that mistakes of the past are not repeated.
