THE STATUE OF LIBERTY

Where did our Statue of Liberty come from?

An idea that originated with Édouard René de Laboulaye of France. French sculptor Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi moved the idea forward, believing that such a project would be best represented as a joint project between France and America for the 1886 USA Centennial.

What material is the Statue of Liberty made out of and why?

Copper (3/32" thick, or 2 pennies thick) is the material used to create the exterior of Lady Liberty, which as it has oxidized provides the familiar "patina" green color. Both the oxidization and the use of copper are a natural way to protect the metal from the elements. The torch, which is lit up at night, is covered in 24k gold, with the gold added in the 1986 renovation.

For most of America's history, voting was very public with no expectation that your vote would be done in private. All elections were non-secret. Just the same as electioneering was public, so was the day of voting. These were public events, to be full of celebrations and discourse. Voters and non-voters would all gather, participating in the community's events. In the 1890's, the voting process began to change as the "secret ballot" aka "Australian Ballot" began to take hold.
